
Sustainable Product Packaging

Why is it, that we reuse the same clothing, reuse the same plates and utensils, keep the same cars, and for most of us the same relationships for years on end, yet when it comes to buying some shampoo at the store we have to get a new bottle every single time? It would seem to me that there should be a better way in the form of reusing the same product containers and packages rather than wasting container after container for products that don't really require brand new containers for each use.

Yes! Here's why: We don't need to have new containers each and every time we buy certain products.

Let's take a look at our example shampoo. Remember when they used to ask you if you wanted paper or plastic at the grocery store? You could never decide because one of them was killing a tree, and the other one was creating non-biodegradable waste that could possibly kill an endangered animal. Then, all of a sudden someone had the grand idea to market reusable shopping bags that were made of fabric. It was bold and new, except, it wasn't all that new. People have used reusable containers to take their goods to and from market places for eons; we just took a step backwards off the track when we created disposable carrying containers (paper and plastic bags).
